Nilüfer Bolat from Gaziantep Kolej Vakfi Primary School convinced her class to imitate animals, resulting in one of the most popular of her lessons in which even the shyest of her students were keen to take part and 'become an animal'. Melike Taskin from Özel Ülkem Private School wrote how splitting a second-grade class up into pairs, making them write dialogues, and a 'sandwich shop' resulted in her best lesson. Possibly the most bizarre story of all came from Merve Oflaz from Istek Acibadem Primary School, who related how getting 12year-olds to impersonate John Lennon, Yoko Ono and Lennon's murderer had resulted in her most popular lesson.
